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QUARANTINE REQUIREMENTS FOR THE IMPORTATION OF DISABILITY ASSISTANCE DOGS FROM APPROVED COUNTRIES IN WHICH DOG-MEDIATED RABIES IS ABSENT OR WELL-CONTROLLED

1. These conditions apply to the importation of **disability assistance dogs** from certain countries and territories recognised by the Australian Government as countries or territories in which dog-mediated rabies is absent or well controlled. Dogs imported into Australia other than from New Zealand must undergo a period of post-arrival quarantine, normally in a government quarantine station. These conditions are designed to allow the performance of quarantine as **quarantine surveillance** outside a government quarantine station so that the disabled person may have the use of his/her assistance dog during that period.

A list of **Approved Countries and Territories in which Dog-mediated Rabies is Absent or Well Controlled** is at **Appendix 1**. The list is subject to change. Importers should check with the *Principal Veterinary Officer (Quarantine)* [PVO(Q)] at the time of applying for an Import Permit.

2. These conditions form part of the **Permit to Import**. Applications to import must be on the prescribed **Application Form**. Application Forms are available from the PVO(Q) in the State of import. Importation must be through Sydney, Melbourne or Perth. The addresses of the PVO(Q) in these places is at **Appendix 2**. The applicant must nominate, in the third box of Section 2 of the Application Form, the address of the premises at which the dog will be kept while under quarantine surveillance (the **Nominated Address**).

Copies of the following documents must be appended to the Application Form:

- . a declaration (at **Appendix 3**) signed by the disabled person (or, if the person is unable to sign, his or her carer) that
 - the dog has been in his/her service for at least 6 months
 - he/she agrees to comply with the conditions specified in the declaration
 - the premises at the Nominated Address is suitable for the purpose
- . supporting documentation in relation to the disability of the disabled person
- . documentation, in relation to the dog's training, from:
 - a member school of the International Federation of Guide Dog Schools, **or**
 - a member school of Assistance Dogs International, **or**
 - another organisation recognised by the national government of the country in which the dog was trained as a school for training assistance dogs for disabled people,

which records the permanent identification of the dog and attests that the dog has graduated from that school

- . documents relating to the sanitary conditions listed in section 6 of these conditions, ie rabies vaccination certificate and laboratory report of rabies neutralising antibody titre test on which is recorded the dog's identifying microchip number.

A Permit to Import will not be issued until these documents have been received and found to be in order.

Note: Testing for canine brucellosis, canine ehrlichiosis and leptospirosis is required within 45 days prior to export (sections 8 to 10). We strongly recommend that

- . the dog be tested for these diseases before the application is submitted, to check that the dog is likely to qualify for export when tested later
- . the dog not be mated following this preliminary testing
- . treatment for ticks be commenced at this time, to reduce the risk of the dog becoming infected with these diseases before it is tested again.

3. To facilitate import clearance with minimal delay, a copy of the Permit to Import, copies of laboratory reports of testing for brucellosis, ehrlichiosis and leptospirosis, leptospirosis vaccination certificate (if required) and veterinary certificates of treatment for ticks should be submitted to the PVO(Q) at least **five (5) days** prior to travel. **If this is not done, and/or the documents are unsatisfactory, the dog may be refused entry, or ordered into quarantine at an Animal Quarantine Station, on arrival.**

Originals of the laboratory reports, leptospirosis vaccination certificate (if required) and veterinary certificates of tick treatments must be attached to Veterinary Certificates A & B to be brought by the disabled person, with his/her assistance dog, to Australia.

4. The disabled person must accompany the dog to Australia and must carry, for presentation to a quarantine officer at the port of import:
 - . the complete Permit to Import
 - . the original signed Disabled Person's Declaration and a second copy
 - . **Veterinary Certificate A** signed by the registered or licensed veterinarian or Official Veterinarian who has performed the sampling for testing, treatments and examinations specified in these conditions, and
 - . **Veterinary Certificate B** signed by an Official Veterinarian of the exporting country.

[An Official Veterinarian is a veterinarian authorised by the Veterinary Administration of the exporting country or territory to perform animal health and/or public health inspections of commodities and, when appropriate, perform certification in conformity with the provisions of Chapter 1.3.2. of the OIE

International Animal Health Code. In the case of dogs imported from the USA, Veterinary Certificate B must be signed by an USDA/APHIS Veterinarian.]

The Veterinary certificates A and B (as included with these conditions) must be in English. The dog must be certified as having met the residency, disease testing, treatment and clinical health requirements specified in these conditions. The certification must also include the following information:

- . age or date of birth of the dog
- . the sex, breed, colour, coat type and markings, including distinguishing marks
- . identifying microchip number, type and implantation site
- . place of residency of the dog for the past six (6) months, and information about previous places of residency as specified
- . name and address of the exporter.

Each page of Veterinary Certificate A, the laboratory reports and vaccination certificates must be stamped with an Official Stamp of the Government of the exporting country and be endorsed by signature and date by the Official Veterinarian who completes Veterinary Certificate B.

[Corrections to entries made in the certificates will only be accepted in the following circumstances:

- . correction fluid must **not** be used, and
- . the original entry has been struck through and remains legible and the correction is written adjacent to the original (for example, Breed: ~~Fox Terrier~~ Beagle), and
- . each correction has been signed by the Official Veterinarian.]

GENERAL CONDITIONS

5. Residency

5.1 The dog must have been continuously resident in the country or territory of export for at least six (6) months prior to export, and must not have been in quarantine or under quarantine restriction during the thirty (30) days immediately preceding export, except as provided for in 5.2.

5.2 Australian dogs may be eligible to return to Australia after less than six (6) months residency in the country of export provided the dog has resided continuously in the country since being imported directly from Australia. The following additional conditions apply:

- . the dog must be identified by a microchip that can be read by an Avid, Trovan, Destron or other ISO compatible reader; the microchip must be implanted prior to, or at the time of, rabies vaccination in Australia, and
- . the dog must be vaccinated against rabies with an approved inactivated rabies vaccine at least one (1) month and not more than six (6) months prior to leaving Australia; the microchip number must be recorded on the vaccination certificate, and
- . blood must be taken from the dog at least two (2) weeks after it was vaccinated against rabies and subjected to a rabies neutralising antibody titre test with a positive result (at least 0.5 IU/ml); the microchip number must be recorded on the laboratory report.

Applicants seeking permission to return a dog under these conditions will be required to provide documentary evidence that the rabies vaccination and the rabies neutralising antibody titre test were carried out before the dog left Australia.

SANITARY CONDITIONS

6. Rabies

6.1 Vaccination

The dog must be vaccinated against rabies with an approved inactivated vaccine when at least three (3) months of age:

- a) not less than six (6) months and not more than one (1) year prior to shipment in the case of a primary vaccination;
- b) not more than one (1) year prior to shipment in the case of a booster vaccination;
- c) In the case of a dog returning to Australia under the conditions at 5.2 above, not more than six (6) months prior to leaving Australia.

6.2 Testing and identification

- a) To ensure that the rabies vaccination/s is effective the dog must be subjected not less than six (6) months and not more than twelve (12) months prior to shipment or, in the case of a dog returning to Australia with less than six (6) months residency in the country of export, prior to leaving Australia, to an rabies neutralising antibody titration test using a method endorsed by the OIE Manual of Standards, and its serum must contain at least 0.5 IU/ml.
- b) The dog must be identifiable by a microchip implanted at or before the time of sampling for the rabies neutralising antibody titre test at 6.2 a) or, in the case of a dog returning to Australia with less than six (6) months residency in the country of export, the microchip must have been implanted prior to, or at the time of, rabies vaccination in Australia.

7. Other vaccinations

The dog must have been vaccinated against distemper, infectious hepatitis, canine parvovirus, and parainfluenza at least fourteen (14) days and not more than twelve (12) months prior to export.

The vaccination certificate/s, or copies endorsed by an Official Veterinarian, for these vaccinations must be attached to the Veterinary Certificate B.

8. Brucellosis

- 8.1 The dog must be tested for *Brucella canis* infection by a serum agglutination test (the use of any other test requires prior written permission from AQIS) on a sample collected within forty five (45) days prior to export, with negative results (negative is less than 50% agglutination at a serum dilution of 1:100).

- 8.2 The laboratory report of the test, or a copy endorsed by an Official Veterinarian, must be attached to Veterinary Certificate B.
- 8.3 In the time period between collection of the sample for the test and arrival of the dog in Australia, the dog must not be naturally mated and, in the case of a bitch, must not be artificially inseminated.

9. Ehrlichiosis

9.1 The dog must be tested for *Ehrlichia canis* infection, by the indirect fluorescent antibody test (the use of any other test requires prior written permission from AQIS) at a serum dilution of 1:20, on a sample collected within forty five (45) days prior to export, with negative results.

9.2 The laboratory report of the test, or a copy endorsed by an Official Veterinarian, must be attached to Veterinary Certificate B.

9.3 Within 24 hours following collection of blood for the test, the dog must receive treatment with a parasiticide effective against ticks. This must be re-applied at the minimum time intervals recommended by the manufacturer for the control of ticks until shipment. Treatment should be timed to avoid adverse drug reactions due to any other treatment the dog is being given.

10. Leptospirosis

10.1 The dog must be tested for *Leptospira interrogans* serovar canicola infection by serum agglutination test, by EITHER of the following regimens within forty five (45) days prior to export:

- a) a single test with a negative result (less than 50% agglutination at a serum dilution of 1:100)

OR

- b) in the case of vaccinated dogs only, two tests on samples collected no less than fourteen (14) days apart, each with a titre of not more than 1:400, and the second sample with a titre no higher than the first.

10.2 The vaccination certificate, when applicable, and the laboratory report, or a copy endorsed by an Official Veterinarian, must be attached to Veterinary Certificate B.

11. *Babesia canis*

This clause applies to dogs which have spent part of their lives in a country of Africa.

Within fourteen (14) days prior to export the dog must be treated with imidocarb dipropionate (Forray-65, by Hoechst) or (Imizol by Coopers) at a rate of 7.5mg per kg bodyweight by subcutaneous injection. Treatment should be timed to avoid adverse drug reactions due to any other treatment the dog is being given.

12. Internal parasites

Within fourteen (14) days prior to export the dog must be treated with approved anthelmintics effective against nematodes and cestodes. The active ingredient/s and dose rate must be recorded on Veterinary Certificate A. Treatment should be timed to avoid adverse drug reactions due to any other treatment the dog is being given.

13. External parasites

Within fourteen (14) days prior to export the dog must be treated with an approved broad-spectrum parasiticide effective against ticks, mites and fleas. The active ingredient/s and dose rate must be recorded on Veterinary Certificate A. Treatment should be timed to avoid adverse drug reactions due to any other treatment the dog is being given.

14. Pre-export inspection

Within 72 hours prior to export the dog must be examined by a registered veterinarian or an Official Veterinarian and found to be free from clinical signs of infectious or contagious disease, and external parasites, and to be fit to travel.

15. Laboratory testing

All immunological tests are to be carried out by official diagnostic laboratories approved by the competent authority of the exporting country. An approved laboratory need not be situated in the country of export, ie the blood/serum samples may be sent to another country for testing. Permits to export and import the samples may need to be obtained from the relevant authorities.

TRANSPORT

16. In the case of air travel the dog must be transported in a manner acceptable to the airline and to the government of the exporting country. The dog should be normally transported as cargo in a container that complies with the standards specified in the International Air Transport Association (IATA) Live Animals Regulations. If acceptable to the airline, the dog may be transported in the passenger cabin with the disabled person importing it.
17. If being consigned by sea, the Master of the vessel and the Port Authority must certify that, as far as can be determined, the dog had no contact with other animals at each port of call.
18. During transport to Australia the dog must be transported to the port of export only through countries and parts of the territory of countries to which these conditions apply or that are rabies free. It must not be trans-shipped (change of aircraft or vessel) other than in a rabies free country or territory or in a country or territory approved in Appendix I of these conditions. Trans-shipment will require the approval of the relevant authority in the country of trans-shipment as well as the prior approval of the PVO(Q).
19. The PVO(Q) must be notified, at least 72 hours prior to departure, of the scheduled date, time and place of arrival of the dog, the flight number/ship number and, in the case of air travel, whether

the dog will be travelling as cargo or in the passenger cabin, so that appropriate arrangements for clearance can be made to avoid undue delay.

POST ARRIVAL QUARANTINE

20. Each dog imported under these conditions will, after arrival, be required to serve thirty (30) days quarantine in an approved animal quarantine station or, at the discretion of the PVO(Q), will be released from quarantine under quarantine surveillance for the same period. The conditions of release under quarantine surveillance are detailed in the attached Disabled Person's Declaration (Appendix 3).

Dogs validly returning to Australia with less than six (6) months residency in the country of export must also serve at least thirty (30) days in quarantine or under quarantine surveillance on arrival.

21. On arrival of the disabled person and his/her disability assistance dog in Australia a Quarantine Veterinary Officer (QVO) shall check the accompanying documentation and examine the dog. If the documentation is unsatisfactory and/or if the QVO considers the dog to be showing signs of disease or infestation with external parasites, the QVO may require the dog to be treated, or may order it into quarantine at an Animal Quarantine Station, or may require that it be exported, at the importer's expense.
22. If the documentation is satisfactory and the dog passes the examination the QVO may endorse the Disabled Person's Declaration and may release the dog under quarantine surveillance pursuant to sub-regulation 36 (2) of the Quarantine (Animals) Regulations. The QVO shall retain the signed disabled person's declaration but will provide a copy to the disabled person.
23. During quarantine or while under quarantine surveillance the dog may be subjected to any additional testing or treatment, as specified by AQIS, at the importer's expense.
24. At the end of the period of quarantine or quarantine surveillance the dog will be released from quarantine control and compliance with the conditions of quarantine surveillance will no longer be required.

IMPORTATION OF DISABILITY ASSISTANCE DOGS INTO AUSTRALIA

DISABLED PERSON'S DECLARATION

CONDITIONS OF QUARANTINE SURVEILLANCE

- 2 The disability assistance dog will remain leashed and under my direct control at all times when it is not confined at the Nominated Address.
- 3 I will promptly inform AQIS of any illness of the dog. If I seek veterinary treatment of the dog I will advise the attending veterinarian that the animal is under quarantine surveillance and that a veterinary report for AQIS is required.

I understand that the Quarantine Veterinary Officer may visit the Nominated Address at any time while the dog is under quarantine surveillance and, in signing this Declaration, I agree to co-operate in this matter with the Quarantine Veterinary Officer.

I understand that the dog will remain under quarantine surveillance for 30 days or such greater period as the Quarantine Veterinary Officer may decide.

I also understand that the Quarantine Veterinary Officer may exercise powers under the Quarantine Act 1908 without my prior approval including requiring the dog to be inspected, treated, tested or removed to an animal quarantine station.
